St. Eustace Church News




At the recent Parochial Parish Council, the policies for Safeguarding, Health, Safety and Fire and Data Protection were updated and are now displayed in the Church. Alice Church is trained as the Church Safeguarding Officer as well as being the Churchwarden.

The PCC began to discuss the findings of Quinquennial Report 2021, produced every 5 years by a specialist surveyor who visits the Church, as a Grade 1 listed building, and lists all the works necessary to be undertaken to maintain this historic building. It is the PCC's responsibility to undertake and fund this work, using specialists and with the permission of the Diocese of Salisbury. As with all ancient buildings this is an expensive business.

The Diocese of Salisbury have asked Parishes to complete a survey to find out their opinions as to how the yearly Share that the PCC pay to provide clergy in our Benefice (Hazelbury Bryan, Woolland, Ibberton, Belchalwell, Mappower and Fifehead Neville) is calculated. Our Share last year was £7,000. This is funded by collections, monthly giving, gift aid recovery and fund raising.

The PCC thank Fiona Closier for giving the PCC the opportunity to raise money for Church Funds by providing the teas at her two recent National Garden Scheme openings of her beautiful garden. Thank you to all who helped by serving and making marvellous cakes. £300 was raised on behalf of the Church.

On **Saturday 10th September** the Tour of Britain cycle race [The Tour of Britain | Stage Seven Timetable](#) will be using Dorset roads passing through Milton Abbas and along the top of Bulbarrow hill towards Belchalwell. The Month for Fetes

This appears to be the best month for fetes. Haymaking is over and the weather, although unreliable, is usually favourable for outdoor activities.

The first fete I remember at Ibberton took place in the field called Silverlands, owned at that time by Edward King of Church House Farm, grandfather of Kay.

The photo shows him leading the Temperance Society on their Annual Parade through Ibberton, maybe to the fete I remember.



The attractions at this fete were a swing, a bran tub, cakes and teas and bring and buy stalls.

I remember particularly the bags of confetti, which the boys purchased to stuff down the necks of the girls' dresses.

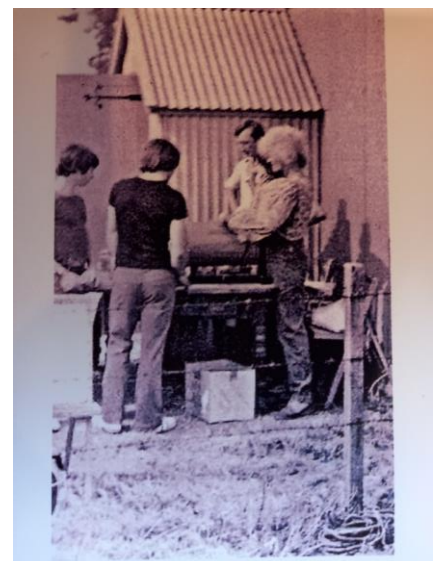
I went once on the swing but it was pushed so high, I didn't venture again.

One of the competitions popular in early fetes was the ankle competition.

Ladies sat behind a screen with only their ankles showing. The one with most votes for her attractive ankles was the winner.

Tug of War was popular and still is.

One year Elizabeth Frink, famous sculptress from Woolland House, opened the fete and attracted a large crowd. This is the only photo I can find.





Usually, the annual fete took place on the rectory lawn, now *Gray Gables*, with bowling for animals as a great attraction.

I remember my husband asking my father for my hand in marriage while he was in charge of the bowling. The noise was chaotic but my dad replied, "Yes that will be alright. "

Farm, we harvested a corn crop in Upper Ground. We are not arable farmers as you will know, the land is not suitable. Upper Ground is about the only field you could get away with it. We harvested it the old-fashioned way with a binder to make sheaves and hauled them to make a rick using a horse cart! The children - Katherine and Belinda aged 5yrs and 2yrs loaded up the Donkey Cart with some assistance obviously - to help with the carrying.



Eldest daughter Charlotte and I were not around to enjoy this unique occasion. Why? Well, it must have been the first week in August, so we were both at Pony Club camp. After the corn was threshed (extracted) the straw went for thatch which I believe was the main reason for the whole thing.

Anyway, this present heatwave which has followed a fairly miserable June, has seen farmers make some lovely hay, probably not quite the quantity but certainly the quality and now full swing with the harvest. Mother Nature usually puts things right in the end!



My thanks to everyone who supported our Coffee Morning in June. Not many children so the ponies didn't have to work very hard. Everyone was extremely generous and we made over £500 for Woolland Church.

The next big village event is the fete and as you will know my job will again be the dog show. This is just a fun, friendly family show, any breed, size or shape so do join in. We will hope the heatwave is over but we do not want well, we know what we do not want! See you there! **Patsy Harris**

JUMBLE CAKE

100g/4oz soft butter or margarine

90g/3 1/2 oz brown sugar

2 eggs, beaten

150g/5oz plain flour

3ml/ 1/2t.baking powder

275g/10oz "Jumble" mixture of any dried fruits & chocolate chips (any mix will do but include some mixed peel and dates, prunes or apricots)

1/3 cup milk
Grease a 15 cm cake tin or 450g / 1 lb. loaf tin.



1. Preheat oven to 160C/325F/Gas 3
2. Beat butter and sugar until fluffy.
3. Gradually beat in eggs.
4. Fold in the flour and baking powder.
5. Stir in the jumble mixture, add a little milk depending on the size of eggs.
6. Spoon into the prepared tin.
7. Sprinkle the top with brown sugar.
8. Bake for 50 - 60 mins or until golden, and centre tests done

The Garden August 2022

August garden tips

At the time of writing this the weather is still very warm and like many of you the garden is extremely dry. Try and keep watering to a minimum- pots and vegetables the priority. If possible, group pots together and in as much shade as possible. This helps with the watering and limits scorching. If you have a greenhouse, make sure it is fully ventilated day and night, cover plants with fleece if in direct sunlight and water twice daily being careful not to splash the leaves. Tomatoes and cucumbers will be growing rapidly now and need feeding every week and twice weekly if watering a lot. Continue to tie them in and make sure the supports are stable to hold the increasing weight of fruit.

In the vegetable garden start harvesting the beans, salads courgettes etc, and again feed on a regular basis to ensure good cropping. Try and water early morning or evening depending on the aspect - evening watering is best as the cooler conditions at night mean less water is lost due to evaporation. Once watered well, a mulch can also be applied to lower evaporation. Although it is easier and quicker to water at high pressure, a slower and more thorough dousing is preferable and will give the plant a better chance of absorption.



The borders may look a little jaded, however will be revived with a shower of rain! Continue dead heading roses etc to encourage more flowering, and cut back perennials that are dying back- if we have some rain they may even give you a second flush in the autumn. Collect seeds from favourite plants, label and store somewhere cool and dry. Poppy heads, nigella and any other good plants for drying can be cut and hung somewhere darkish with airflow for winter decorations/ Shrubs that have flowered should also be pruned now if necessary. Hedge cutting should be left until at least the end of the month, as given the good weather many of the birds are having 2nd if not 3rd clutches- also please provide clean water for the birds if possible.



In the fruit cage, summer fruiting raspberry canes can be cut down now if they have finished and you can lift and pot up rooted strawberry runners. A good feed and water can be given after this.

Lawn cutting should be kept to a bare minimum in the hot weather to prevent scorching, and if you need

to mow have the blades high to prevent scalping it.

With all this to do you will be exhausted especially if you have children at home for the holidays, so the

most important tip of all is to take time to enjoy your garden in this beautiful weather, and relax knowing that nature will come to your rescue as the weather cools and the rain comes!!!
