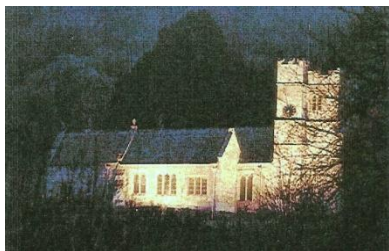
Sunday 16th January 11am @ Ibberton and Belchalwell Village Hall

Benefice News

Wednesday 2nd February 7.30pm re-Commissioning of the Local Ministry Group (LMG) by the Archdeacon of Sherborne, Ven. Penny Sayer at the church of St Mary & St James Hazelbury Bryan DT10 2ED, This service is unique to this Benefice; the first Commissioning of the LMG took place in 2013 when the Benefice was in vacancy and was renewed in 2016 when a House for Duty Priest was appointed. As David Dunning explains 'the LMG is a very rare gathering of clergy/lay leadership, it's excellent that we are commissioned together, in fact I can't think of anything else quite like it'.

Lay ministers are not always recognised and include in this way, meeting regularly with clergy monthly to share the ministry leadership; this has worked exceedingly well over the last 8 years and will continue to do so during the period of vacancy, it affords a real sense of continuity and vision.

It is a very important statement from the Benefice about the value we place on all Ministry, Lay and Ordained; please do attend the service on February 2nd.

Moving on -

At the meeting of the extended Ministry team on November 16th some of the practicalities of the forthcoming vacancy were discussed. It is hoped to re-start the Benefice Magazine (see item below), and to continue to issue a Benefice News on a regular basis. Please help if you can! Jestyn has kindly offered to oversee these important aspects of communication and would value your support; please contact him to see what needs doing! Please do not feel that you would be overwhelmed or out of your depth, if everyone does one small thing the Benefice will continue to run smoothly! Ibberton Parish Council Update

The parish council met on 14th October, the first "in person" meeting for 18 months. We were joined by one intrepid villager. Minutes and agendas of this and all previous meetings are available to view on our web site - www.ibbertonparishcouncil@chessck.co.uk . Paper copies are also on the notice board. This is a brief summary of key points.

Covid stopped all public meetings. Sadly, this meant the annual parish meeting couldn't take place in May 2020. This was a particular shame because it had been planned to share the results of the "Ibberton 2020 Vision" questionnaire. Even now there is a sense of some unease about larger gatherings indoors and so the council has decided to share the results and conclusions in a written summary that will be delivered to every household in the next few weeks.

As usual, a number of highway issues were discussed - speeding, debris on the roads, overhanging trees, partial road repairs at Stibbles Lane, parking at Cutlers Close etc - and we are waiting for our Community Highways Officer to come out to see issues first hand. Whether Dorset Council has the will or the funds to do anything is a moot point. Two fingerposts were damaged by hedge cutters but both have been replaced.

The parish council continues to work on trying to provide a small play area for children. It's quite tricky as the parish council doesn't have any land of its own to use. Discussions continue about possible sites and it's proving to be a long, drawn out process. Hopefully we might get somewhere before the children grow up!

Next meeting is likely to be held just before or just after Christmas

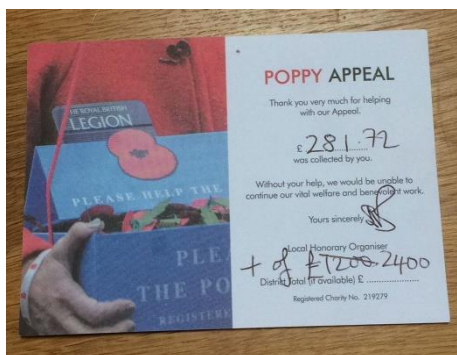

It explored the life of Florence Nightingale from the perspective of a campaigner and reformer whose pioneering use of statistics, called for government accountability and equal access to healthcare for all. Louise continually connected Florence's work in the 19th century with the issues we continue to face today.

The performance featured significant events, people and experiences in her life and included music, song, current news items and an interactive quiz.

Following a break and a chance to meet Louise, socialise, visit the bar or purchase tea/coffee with Dorset Apple cake, a pub style quiz occurred. Each table formed a team and with six rounds of questions, including aspects from the show and current health concerns in the 21st century, the atmosphere was thought provoking and gently

competitive! The Hall received 30% of the door and raffle/bar/refreshment monies.

A Childhood Christmas in Ibberton 1939



I was five years old at this time and the Second World War had commenced three months previously. No lights were to be shown after dark so blackout curtains were in force and ration books restricted the amounts of food allowed to each person. I awoke on Christmas morning to the joy of unpacking my Father Christmas stocking. First was a book, *Tarka the Otter*. The wonderful smell of that new book remains with me still today. Next was a small doll, then a packet of hankies, one for each day of the week. Next came a colouring book. Deep in the toe were an orange and a Blenheim apple. The apple I recognised as one from our own apple store. In the kitchen, which had no water tap or electricity, my mum was cooking breakfast, bacon and our own hens' eggs. My dad returned from milking the cows by hand in their stalls so I was able to present him with a new pencil to write out his milk churn labels. Milk churns were collected from the milk stands for delivery to the milk factory. One of these stands is still outside Parhams farm, now owned by the Dorans. Several more can be seen around the village.

An important part of the day was the church service at 11am. The church was full, everyone walking to church despite the heavy frost and fog. There were just two cars in Ibberton, one owned by Kay's dad at the Manor House and one by the Joyces' at Manor Farm. The church was heated by a tortoise stove and hanging lamps were lit by Mrs Robbins and Miss Heal.

After church we were home for Christmas dinner which was probably a roast chicken and vegetables from our own garden. The drink provided was a bottle of Stones Ginger wine. I, being the youngest by seven years, was not allowed to partake. The Christmas pudding came next. Dried fruit was carefully saved for this. A little coin was hidden inside the mixture.

There was a welcoming log fire in the sitting room where I played with a new doll which my brother Bob had given me. I knew this doll well as being a nosey child I had discovered it in Bob's bedroom drawer a month before. Tea time was a cosy affair with the fire burning brightly and the oil lamps giving a magical glow. My mum's best tea set was in use. We ate sandwiches and a Christmas cake decorated with green and red icing. A thin layer of marzipan covered the top. Sugar was in short supply so only my dad was allowed sugar in his tea. He certainly needed it as his work was very demanding. This was a very happy day. I spent time before bed reading my book fortified by a bowl of hazel nuts gathered in the autumn from trees upon the hill. We gathered sacks of them and all free.

The following evening mum dad and I walked to Uncle George's home now called Shoemakers for supper which comprised of salmon sandwiches, and, best of all, half oranges with the filling removed and jelly in its place.

This was very different from the previous Christmas when we all gathered at my Grandmother Mary's house to perform little plays to amuse her. This I cannot recall. However, Christmas 1939 was a truly magical one for me.

Kay's Boiled Fruit Cake

Ingredients:-

4oz (114grams) Margarine
6oz (170grams) Brown Sugar
14oz (400grams) Mixed Dried Fruit (including mixed peel)
1oz (30grams) Chopped Glace Cherries
1 teacup water
1 level tsp Bicarbonate Soda
1 Heaped tsp Mixed Spice
2 Eggs (beaten)
8oz (227grams) Self Raising Flour



Method:-

Place margarine, dried fruit, sugar, bicarbonate & mixed spice in a pan, bring to the boil & simmer gently for 2 minutes.

1. Pour into a large bowl & allow to cool.
2. Add eggs & flour to cooled mixture.
3. Mix well
4. Pour into a lined 8" round cake tin
5. Bake 350 °F, 180°C on lower shelf, reduce heat a little after 30 minutes.
6. Bake a further 45 minutes approximately

(they have a small breakfast) Not yet!



Bandon (the dog) and I set forth into the road to go and get the other three. What on earth ...did I say road? Well, it was a river and I mean exactly that, the pond had completely overflowed over the road and down Watery Lane (no need to ask why it's called Watery Lane!) Not just a stream, but the entire width of the lane and down to the field gate where the horses were supposed to exit. I struggled down to the gate and the water had transformed most of the field into a lake. In all the years we have lived here at Marsh Farm, (over 50) I have never seen so much of the field under water. Anyway, the horses were obviously

delighted to return to their stable and didn't quite drown me as I held the gate open, Yes, they go up the road on their own - food awaits them!

By this time I was pretty wet as well, threw the cats their biscuits and returned to the house, even the dog had had enough of it. My wet weather gear hadn't served its purpose, I was wet to the skin. Very few callers that morning but to my amazement the road cleared very quickly thank goodness. It must have been the "clearing up storm" as they say as we have had very little rain since and Keats words have become more appropriate!

Would you like a solar photovoltaic rooftop array?

Electricity prices have rocketed this year on the back of high gas prices and are not set to become decoupled from fossil fuels until the UK has a lot more than the current 40% generation from renewables. So now is a good time to be thinking about putting solar photovoltaic (PV) panels on your roof.

Back in 2011 we had a 4 kW PV (16 x 250 watt panels) array installed on our house roof in Hazelbury Bryan. It cost us a whopping £14,900 but we did have the feed in tariff (FIT) to look forward to. This has paid us around £2,200 each year in addition to our electricity bill savings so we had payback after 6 years and we still have 15 years of FITs pay outs to come. Our installation has been a very good investment. This is proven by the fact that we regularly get chancing letters from companies offering to buy our installation; a sort of equity release, so they can get their grubby hands on our lucrative FITs.

When FITs for new installations was dropped in 2016, installations obviously declined dramatically. However, the cost of the equipment falls every year, yet the quality increases. You can now get a sleek, good quality 4.44 kW PV installation (12 x 370 watt all black panels) for around £4,500 that will pay you back in 5 - 9 years (depending on how much daytime electricity you use.)

The parish of Hazelbury Bryan now has a Climate and Ecological Emergency Group. We intend installing PV on the parish hall roof and following three quotes, we have now decided our preferred panels and installer. The Q cells Korean panels are one of the very few with a full 25 year product warranty, yet are still very reasonably priced at £112 per panel wholesale. We also have a group of householders in the village intending to install PV. So we hope to get a group installation to enable economies of scale and around £350 off the usual price.

I would be pleased to hear from any householder in Ibberton, Belchalwell & Woolland prepared to see installation of PV during the first half of 2022.
